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- Pastor's Note: Welcome to Black History Month! -

Since 1976, February has been celebrated as Black History Month in the United States. North Madison Congregational Church will honor Black history this February by hosting a series of events, speakers, and topics, and by lifting up the accomplishments of a notable Black American each week in our worship bulletin. It seems fitting to inaugurate this month by reflecting on the man who launched Black History Month, Dr. Carter G. Woodson (1875-1950). Dr. Woodson devoted his life to the pursuit of informing Black Americans about the excellence of their ancestries – bringing to light stories and people that white “American history” often leaves out of history textbooks and national celebrations. By the time of Dr. Woodson’s death in 1950, African History *Month* had begun to be celebrated around the nation. The designation became official in 1976 on the 50th anniversary of the first Negro History Week. As a largely white Open and Affirming congregation in a largely white community, we will honor Dr. Woodson’s legacy and educate ourselves a little more this month about the wonderful contributions of Black Americans to our national heritage and Madison community. This is godly work – and in many American churches, even in our denomination of progressive “firsts,” it is scandalously long overdue, and deeply important.

Our worship team and I hope you will join us in worship in the weeks ahead as we build upon the power of last month’s Martin Luther King, Jr. celebration and of our third ONA anniversary, February 5th, to be inspired by the rich achievements of Black Americans and to reflect on the ways

our North Madison and UCC heritages have shaped and been shaped by Black history – an important part of sacred human history that is part of what makes us who we are. As those who follow Jesus, we are part of a movement to bring reconciliation among people and God (2 Cor. 5:18-20), and so we are working on doing our part in educating ourselves at NMCC and in truth telling.

We pray God blesses our efforts, and that we will see you soon in the sanctuary!

**Covenanting with Pastor Heather
on Sunday, February 2, 2020, at 2 p.m., and before, and
after... ;)**

On 2/2/2020 at 2 p.m., we celebrate a service of covenanting and installation with the New Haven East Consociation of the UCC and our new settled pastor, the Rev. Dr. Heather Arcovitch. We are already warmed and inspired by our partnership in ministry with Pastor Heather, and she is equally excited about what God is doing among and through us and what lies ahead. The Diaconate and Worship Team have planned a full, celebratory day for 2/2/20, and we hope that many members and friends will be part of as much of the day as you can.



Following our 10 am worship, there will be a pizza and salad lunch and a fun trivia competition (like a trivia night during the day) to bring us through to the Service of Installation at 2 p.m. Children are welcome and encouraged to stay!

An installation is like a marriage between pastor and congregation. We are currently engaged, and our commitment is real; and because we are part of the wider church, the official liturgy of installation and covenant happens in the presence and with the participation of the Consociation in which our congregation and clergyperson hold standing. This is one of the rare and meaningful opportunities for us to worship with the wider church. We will welcome denominational officials, local clergy, interfaith partners, and friends into our sanctuary as participants and witnesses to our shared ministry and the promises we will make before God to love, serve, and grow together for the furtherance of God's mission in the world. Please plan to be part of as much of the day as you can. It will be a special one. It happens only once in the life of each pastoral/congregational relationship. Your presence will add to its meaning.

We Are Going to Free Vulnerable Connecticut Families From Medical Debt!

Families across this nation are receiving letters. The letters begin with life-changing words: "Your debt is forgiven." The letters conclude with names of local United Churches of Christ that have purchased the medical debt of the letter recipients, freeing them from collections to resume life. You see, when impoverished neighbors fall into debt because of medical bills they cannot pay, hospitals sell the debt for pennies on the dollar to predatory debt collectors who purchase the right to pursue debt collection in whatever cruel and dehumanizing ways they see fit, and to profit from their payment. The letters our impoverished American neighbors are receiving, however, rather than listing the terrifying demands of debt collectors, say instead: "You may never enter the doors of any of our churches...but we love you...because we are the Church. And, more importantly, you are beloved by God. Because of that love, your debt is forgiven."

Saint Louis' UCCs' combined contributions of \$105,000 purchased and eliminated \$12.9 million in debt for vulnerable families. This is breathtaking. What can we in the Connecticut UCC do?

This month, NMCC has received a letter from the Southern New England Conference inviting us to join with others across the country to raise money to buy debt from collectors and free vulnerable families from continued stress and vulnerability. Families who will benefit live below the federal poverty line. We will not know who receives the debt forgiveness, only the neighborhoods in which they live – in Connecticut the neighborhoods identified for relief are in Bridgeport and Hartford. We are all one catastrophic medical event away from potential disaster – and the working poor living without health insurance are particularly vulnerable.

Pastor Heather and the Deacons have designated this life-changing ministry to be the beneficiary of her installation service offering. Heather is giving \$1,000 to the initiative as a love offering honoring our congregation. She hopes this will also inspire us to give generously. An offering will be received at her installation on February 2, and at any time through our website or by check. Please write checks to NMCC with "UCC debt relief" on the memo line. Thank you for sharing your love, and God's healing, with our neighbors in need.

- This Month In Worship! -

February is Black History Month, the third anniversary of our Open and Affirming designation, and the historic installation of our first openly gay female senior minister! Join us in celebrating all that God is doing in our midst and in learning more about the existence and heritage of privilege, oppression, slavery, and tenacious hope and human triumph not only in New England but right here in Madison and Guilford. Mark your calendars!

On February 2 during worship we celebrate our ONA covenant, install our Deacons and Jr. Deacons, and inaugurate our Black History Month reflections. At 2:00, we receive guests from the wider church and community and covenant together with our new settled pastor in a service of wonderful music and prayer. (In between, there will be pizza and a fun trivia game – stay and make a day of it!)

On February 9 we will reflect on love, legacy, and legacy giving with valentine chocolate and beautiful choral music that reflects the above and honors beloved members, Marilyn and Bob Linn.

On February 16 Elizabeth Normen, publisher of *Connecticut Explored* magazine, will speak to us during the sermon time about her newest book and accompanying 5-8th-grade curriculum about Venture Smith. Venture Smith was an enslaved person brought to Connecticut in 1737. He purchased his freedom, became a successful entrepreneur, and purchased his wife and children's freedom. He narrated his story to the editor of the *New London Bee*, who published it 1798. Elizabeth has made Venture's story accessible to students, and placed it in its historical context. She writes in the introduction to *Venture Smith's Colonial Connecticut*: "It introduces students to issues of race and racism in the founding of the United States ... to the fact that slavery did not just happen in the South, and that New England, too, was founded on this cruel institution." Elizabeth will speak to us about why it is so important for students, and all of us, to develop this understanding.

On February 23 during worship we will further our study with Dennis Culliton, the co-founder of the Witness Stones Project (<https://witnessstones.org/>). Dennis will speak to us about his work to

honor enslaved residents of Guilford by placing stone memorials on the properties where they lived. A retired Adams Middle School teacher, he has done extensive research into our local history and placed at least 18 stones in locations in Guilford, Madison and West Hartford thus far. The Witness Stones Project is "an attempt to come to terms with Connecticut's past in regards to slavery, a history that is often glossed over, if not outright forgotten". Dennis will speak to us about why truth and reconciliation in regard to slavery are essential in moving toward racial justice in America, and about how we can get involved.

February 26 is Ash Wednesday. Please mark the date and join us in the sanctuary at 7pm for ashes and meditations to welcome the Lenten Journey. Our worship theme for Lent is Creation Care, honoring Jesus' journey into the wilderness and God's call to humanity to be stewards of Creation.

We are off to a very busy start to the new year! Our focus this fall was on serving in our NMCC community as well as sharing fellowship with our church family. As we go deeper into this winter and progress into spring, we have opportunities lined up for our youth to serve in New Haven, NYC, and Maine, while we learn about food insecurity and homelessness in various locations in New England.

Now the rest: Youth in A Roman Field is a most interesting collaborative fronted by singer-songwriter-violinist Claire Wellin. Most often, though, it's four or five musicians who are all extremely accomplished. All that's insignificant, as what Youth really is an attitude and an experience. The band is clearly having fun playing, and it shows. They don't worry about perfection, they just feel the music so profoundly. Another Way You Can Serve NMCC - Treasurer: Are you looking for a new way to serve NMCC? Has God gifted you in the area of finance or accounting? NMCC is looking for a new Treasurer. As an officer of the church, the Treasurer must be a member in good standing and have a general understanding of generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Your time and talents will be needed at least two hours per week to review timesheets, sign paychecks and checks, review A/R for coding and proper documentation, and read and address the Treasurer's email. An additional 2-4 hours per month would be invested in reviewing bank reconciliation reports and the general ledger (including income and expenses) and preparing monthly reports and meetings with the Board of Finance and the Executive Committee. At year end, the Treasurer prepares annual financial reports and works with the Board of Finance in developing annual budgets with each of the Teams/Committees and Boards, and works with the Audit Committee in carrying out an annual audit.
